District wide we have a 94.7% graduation rate, we have clear increases in Foster Youth graduation rates, changing from 56.3% to 85.7%, and "good" Hispanic graduation rates. We are also pleased with the results in English Language Arts, College and Career Readiness. Our Asian scores are the highest on the California School Dashboard, and we have a decline in the total number of students suspended. The Survey results show that 93.7% of parents feel attendance is emphasized. In general, we are maintaining a student's ability to "connect" to their school.  This is a result of school–wide activities, increases in leadership opportunities, and better "on boarding" of new students. To sustain and improve, we would like to implement a stronger mentoring program.
